AUSTIN MUTUAL AID HISTORY AND FINANCIAL TRANSPARENCY

Austin Mutual Aid (AMA) was founded March 2020, at the start of the pandemic, in order to counteract the multiple crises affecting vulnerable populations. The predicted economic downturn following the Covid-19 outbreak was yet another crisis on top of the violence of white supremacist culture and the growing inequality here in the United States.

Austin Mutual Aid was founded with an explicit emphasis on resource sharing between individuals, connecting those with overflowing pantries with those struggling to buy groceries.

Austin Mutual Aid Mission Statement

Austin Mutual Aid is a grassroots organization whose mission is to empower and sustain vibrant, joyful, resilient communities. We do this by prioritizing the power of long-term, two-way relationships of exchange. We believe in the principles of solidarity, mutual aid, and autonomous direct action. By working with, listening to, and seeking leadership from impacted communities, especially the most vulnerable and historically under-served members-we build long-term, sustainable communities that can weather any storm.

Mutual Aid not Charity

Mutual aid is the oldest form of exchange on earth and is a foundation of healthy communities. There is an assumption through mutual aid that a person will repay a gift at some later time in some ambiguous way, either to the giver or to the general community. Giving a birthday present, loaning a neighbor a lawnmower, listening to a friend talk about their breakup, are all examples of mutual aid. These acts of vague debt are what bind people in relationships and is the glue that bonds community together.



Supply Request Demographics:



Austin Mutual Aid (AMA) founded.


The first



Gofundme campaign launched.



Campaign raised \$25k for water, tarps, tents & paid a \$125 stipend weekly to a recently unhouse organizer. (These funds not included in "Funds Spent" page)



April, 2020




COVAID platform initiated to streamline resource and service requests and offers throughout Austin.

July, 2020



Beat the Heat water, tents and tarps were distributed by AMA &/or ATX Camp Support organizers daily to 13+ camps for 700+ unhoused neighbors.



Aug - Sept, 2020

AMA volunteer cleanup days at Riverside Camp.



Feb 9, 2021 o Polar vortex on its way

AMA publicly pressured the city to open emergency winter shelters.

Hundreds of AMA followers contacted the city manager, city council & mayor to insist that all 2,500 unhoused people be sheltered during the storm.

Aug, 2020



An additional stipend of \$125/wk added to pay for an organizer to assist in running AMA's IG account and other logistics.

"Kick the Cold" Gofundme campaign launched.



We raised funds for water, tents, sleeping bags and other material support.

Feb 11, 2021 (

With only 182 winter shelter beds available, it became alarmingly clear that the city had no plan.



Feb 14, 2021

Polar vortex hits Austin.

The Community Resiliency Trust (CRT) called an emergency meeting. Multiple orgs present incl city officials, the mayor, an unhoused representative & two AMA organizers.



One AMA organizer left to head to camps under the impression that 2500 city-funded hotel rooms would soon be available. The other AMA organizer stayed at the meeting for 10 hrs producing 108 rooms initially funded by Survive to Thrive.

o Feb 13, 2021



Kick the Cold Gofundme pre-storm, approx \$36k raised and spent.

→ Feb 14-15, 2021

AMA, and individuals from multiple orgs incl Austin Community Advancement Brigade, ATX Camp Support, Little Pedal Alliance, CRT, STS and more transport unhoused individuals to hotels.



The next rooms booked were bought on volunteers personal credit cards and refunded by AMA. Initial bookings mostly 4 to 5 days long.

Messaging and media of a bustling distribution center & organizers working with the unhoused caused AMA Instagram, Facebook, Venmo & Gofundme to gain attention.

AMA organizers extend hotel reservations based on promises made by the city about long term housing opportunities.

Late Feb, 2021



It became clear that the city had no plans to reimburse the \$340,000 spent on hotels for the unhoused.

Since the storm, only one city official, Ann Kitchen, offered to meet with Austin Mutual Aid. AMA declined, with a message crafted by Stop The Sweeps, due to the council woman's combative position towards the unhoused.

Feb 24, 2021 ∘

Distribution center moves to the Long Center with better access for drivers, room for multiple pallets of water and goods, admin and distribution space for Austin Needs Water and walk up for low-income families and the unhoused.



Mar 9, 2021

The last hotel rooms paid for by AMA are checked out.
These were supported by multiple groups, including those in and outside of ATX Camp Support, with food and resources.

A commercial bank account is set up under Austin Mutual Aid.

AMA becomes a TUNA -Texas Unincorporated Non-profit Association & receives an EIN.

AMA distribution center pauses operations as the agreed upon time frame that the Long Center offered their space comes to an end.
